From "Quaderni di storia dell'economia politica" to "History of Economic Ideas"

"Quaderni di storia dell'economia politica" began in 1983 and was the result of the collaboration between scholars who shared an analytical and critical approach to the central issues of economics. The journal's aim has been to examine the historical origins of the major economic concepts, the various "revolutions" which have left their mark on it and the spread of economic ideas beyond the narrow circle of specialists. We reject the dichotomy between "analysis" and "culture", "thought" and "doctrine" - all these aspects are of equal importance for a wider understanding of the subject.

The areas covered by "Quaderni", so far have included:

- 1) Preclassical, Classical and Marxian political economy;
- 2) economic liberalism, the Austrian school of economics from Menger to the

- present day, and the impact of Popperian philosophy in economics;
- 3) Marshall and the Marshallian tradition in economics;
 - 4) economic historicism in Germany and Italy, 1880-1910;
 - 5) money, development and methodology in Shumpeter;
 - 6) causality, rationality, and expectations in the history of economics; and
 - 7) the development of economics in Italy during the inter-war period.

In addition, the journal is involved in editing archival economic sources.

The new series of "Quaderni", which will be called "History of Economic Ideas" (Physica Verlag, Heidelberg), intends to pursue the same aims but will have a wider, international scope. The increased number of contributors will encourage a livelier debate. We intend to continue publishing archive sources and relevant studies on Italian economic thought.
