Recent Activities of the Society for the
History of Economic Thought, Japan

The records of recent activities of Japan HET Society since the meetings previously reported are only about the branch activities. But the papers read at the six meetings of the four branches were 17 in all, which may suggest the rather active regional research activities in Japan.

The Kanto branch: On 5 June 1982 at Hohsei University where three papers were read: (1) 'John Millar on the formation of civil society' (Kaneme Ohta); (2) 'Revision of Ricardo's theory of value in his "Principles" (3rd edition)' (Toshimitsu Okamoto); (3) 'Proudhon on "economic revolution" in the period of February Revolution' (Katsujiro Fujita).

The Kansai branch met two times. First, on 30 January at Kobe Women's College, two papers were read: (1) 'British neo-liberalism and social reform' (Norio Anpo); (2) 'Necessity of the theory of firm and the present problems' (Takashi Yoshimi). Secondly on 29 May at Kansai University, general meeting of the branch for this year was held. Takuya Hatori read the paper in the morning, 'An aspect of the formation of Ricardo's theory of rent'. In the afternoon two papers were read under the common theme 'Das Kapital and the studies on the third world' (1) 'Internationalization of capital and the theory of capital circulation' (Kazuhisa Okumura); (2) 'Theories of articulation of modes of production and Das Kapital' (Akitaka Wakamori). After the meeting Andrew S. Skinner (University of Glasgow) gave the lecture as an extra program on 'Adam Smith: Rhetoric and the communication of ideas'.

The Seinan branch had two meetings. On 23-24 January at Yamaguchi University three papers were read: (1) 'Ricardo's theory of wage' (Toshihisa Ikeda); (2) 'Marx and Ricardo in the history of theory of surplus' (Kiyoshi Akita); (3) 'Classical Political Economy and Marx on the theory of credit'. Its July meeting was held on 13-14 July at Hakata Hall in Fukuoka and four papers were read: (1) 'The significance and limitations of the concept of absolute overproduction of capital' (Hajime Nakano); (2) 'An essay toward the theory of economic disequilibrium' (Moriyuki Hosoe); (3) 'Property system and material renewal; examination of Marx's property laws' (Michio Nakao); (4) 'The historical significance of Schultz's theory of productive force' (Kunihiko Uemura).

The Tohoku branch met on 12 June at Tohoku University where two papers were read: (1) 'The change of Hilferding's understanding of Nazis in 1930's' (Masaaki Kurotaki); (2) 'Scientific thinking and the logic of Das Kapital: J. Zeleny's view' (Keizo Hayasaka).

The annual meeting for 1982 will be held at Toyo University in Yokyo on 6-7 November. The common theme of the meeting will be again 'Advanced countries-unverdeveloped countries problem in the history of economic thought', but this time it will be mainly discussed from the standpoint of underdeveloped countries.
